

















What are joint and double doctorates?

Joint doctorates:

- A single diploma (printed by main university)
- Obligatory within Flanders
- Preferred (but uncommon) with foreign universities

Double doctorates:

- Two diplomas
- Common with foreign universities (faster)
- Sometimes referred to as cotutelle

What are the basic concepts of JDs/DDs?

- An intensive collaboration
- A main (lead) university and a partner (host) university
- Doctoral training of main university
- Progress reporting (QC) of main university
- Thesis defence at main university (in English)
- Registration fee only at main university

KU LEUVEN

Our minimum requirements as partner

Training:

- At least 6 months exchange
- Course 'Research Integrity'
- International conference
- Thematic and skills training (in 'lead' university)

Quality control:

- Preliminary work plan (and update on progress)
- Charter: profile of the good promotor & PhD researcher
- Promotor and jury member from both universities
- 1st authorship publication with KU Leuven affiliation

What topics are addressed in the agreement?

- Details on candidate, supervisors, topic, institutions
- Tuition fee, doctoral training, QC, research stays
- Financial provisions & (health) insurance (tax!)
- Ownership of intellectual property & confidentiality
- Publications
- Examination committee, thesis defence, award of degree
- Settlement of disputes
- Validity of agreement (signing)

OJO = "Omkadering Jonge Onderzoekers" (support for young researchers)
































General challenges with JD


- Administrative burden (1.5-2 days/JD)
- Lack of professionalism
- Lack of trust
- Only 3 year funding per doctorate for ITNs
- Country/University-specific issues


