It is a pleasure to provide my first foreword as YERUN President in the YERUN annual report. It is also thanks to her work that I took over the lead knowing that I could count on a sound network, with a clear path to follow and a shared commitment to strengthening the voice of young universities in Europe.

UiT – The Arctic University of Norway, has been a YERUN member for a bit more than 2 years, but it feels like we have been part of the network for much longer. The upcoming European elections, the nomination of a new European Commission, the ongoing negotiations for the next Framework Programme for Research & Innovation and the next ERA Policy Agenda will be some of the avenues in which we can play a significant role, together.

In achieving our shared goals at the lead of YERUN, I know I can count on a dedicated and ambitious Executive Board, whose members I warmly thank for their commitment and always insightful steering, and on strong and reliable YERUN Brussels Office as an extremely valuable support to fulfil the network's mission. I wish the whole YERUN community a wonderful 2024 year ahead, to populate with new goals, milestones and achievements.

The world experiences a multiplicative effect, 'a perfect storm' of economic, political, and social challenges for citizens' welfare. Universities, striving for future resilience and sustainability, should recognise its role as 'rational centres' and seriously and loudly address challenging pushes from the present and pulls from the future. Universities' credibility, more than ever, increasingly depends on demonstrating responsibility and impact. All the YERUN universities recognise that our future lies in the transformation grounded on the overall understanding of these present and future societal challenges for Europe and on valorising the relevance of strengthening the European dimension for universities.

The conclusion of the year is a time to acknowledge our achievements. I take this opportunity to briefly summarise the outcomes and, for me, to officially conclude the two fulfilling years in which I chaired YERUN. Rector of the Arctic University of Norway, Dag Rune Olsen, who was chosen at the General Assembly in October at Nova University in Lisbon, is the new president of YERUN and will continue to work with renewed vigour to strengthen the voice of young European research universities.

During my term as President, our family has expanded to seven new, young institutions in the last two years: the University of Klagenfurt, the University of Potsdam, the University of South-Eastern Norway, the University of Stirling, UiT-The Artic University of Norway, Nicolaus Copernicus University in Toruń, and Tallinn University. At the beginning of 2024 the voice of 24 young research universities is now reaching Central, Eastern, and South-Eastern Europe, making YERUN a truly representative network of young research-intensive academic communities in Europe that recognise their specific mission in regional transformation and impact. In order to improve the inter-connectedness between each individual researcher, we reached an essential decision regarding the cocreation of the YERUN Research Collaborative Platform, a unique virtual community for our researchers. South Denmark University's creativity is being expanded to serve as an innovative meeting place for all YERUN people.

Our collaboration's most significant benefit is our mutual growth as a result of comprehensive discussions and thoughtful deliberation of the future of European universities. Aware that leadership development is a game changer for the transformation of universities, we organised numerous workshops and discussions on research assessment reform, innovative universities of the future, on the role of universities in achieving the UN SDGs and the EU Green Deal, on the European strategy for universities and the role of European alliances, on the ERA Policy Agenda, on knowledge valorisation, and numerous others. We have all witnessed how valuable it is for our universities to advance by exchanging thoughts and lessons learned with key players and policy makers from the European institutions.

We recognise that distinctive comprehension on European policies in the fields of higher education and research, as well as the harnessing of collective intercultural wisdom to the advantage of individual universities and the European university community, constitute the essential value of networks such as YERUN. For the second part of the strategy period, we developed a new action plan and made sure that working groups and other YERUN bodies helped us reach our goals. Our publications demonstrate our relentless commitment to the European vision and contribute to constructive dialogues on a wide range of topics, including the European Excellence Initiative, Horizon Europe and its future FP10, the European Innovation Council, and the European Framework for Sustainable and Attractive Careers in Higher Education. We are persistently committed to fostering open science and how we can innovate within our universities and research environment of the twenty-first century through sustainable education, microcredential, green and digital transformation, and many more.

I would like to express my profound thanks to all of the members of the General Assembly, institutional coordinators, and my Executive Board colleagues as I complete my two-year mandate. The commitment and immense creative potential of this leadership team were invaluable during these periods of joint growth. We owe a special debt of appreciation to the brilliant Silvia Gomez Recio, who served as the Secretary General of the devoted Brussels office, for her extraordinary commitment, professionalism, and work ethic. With the utmost confidence in our togetherness, wisdom and strength I wish the people of YERUN a prosperous and happy 2024.

YERUN GENERAL ASSEMBLIES IN 2023

Limerick, 14 - 16 March 2023

It was a privilege for the University of Limerick (UL) as a relatively new member of YERUN to host the network's General Assembly in March 2023. As we had all just emerged from the Covid pandemic and were wrestling with its longer-term impacts on our students and staff and how we could build on the new ways through which learning, research and work that were facilitated through blended and online modes of engagement. Our complex external operating environments had been affected too and required us to reconsider many of our practices, processes and procedures.



Therefore, my colleagues in UL and I saw this meeting as an opportunity to stimulate a multidimensional exchange with the YERUN members on the future of higher education and through the lens of our shared concerns for sustainability in its broadest sense.

Prof. Dr. Jamil Salmi, the Tertiary Education Coordinator at the World Bank shared his deep insights into the global higher education landscape and primed the discussions for the following two days. His points on education e-

-quity and research excellence, governance and internationalisation amidst the backdrop of radical and relentless changes to world of work and the existential challenges posed by climate change and declining planetary health, dominated the conversations over dinner that night and honed the thoughts for the Strategic Futures workshop the next day.

Led by the UL Centre for Sustainable Futures and Innovation and its Director Andrea Deverell, the hands-on exploration of the next 50 years for higher education aimed to familiarise participants with key concepts and concrete exercises to explore social and political, technological and cultural trends, signals, drivers. Supported by visual trend maps and hands-on exercises existing and emerging opportunities, challenges and uncertainties related for the future of higher education were identified and scrutinised.

Working in small groups, there was plenty of opportunity to share insights, to compare conditions, stablish commonalities and differences as well as to speculate on impact and to probe visions. The international dimension of the dialogic endeavour and the diversity of experiences stimulated a lot of listening and learning, which was enriching. Observing the room and the atmosphere of the workshop it was gratifying to see that everyone got involved and contributed and that discussions ensued over dinner that day. The day enabled participants to get to know each other better and the institutions they represent.

Lisbon, 11-13 October

Between 11 and 13 October, the second General Assembly of the year took place in Portugal, hosted by NOVA University Lisbon. On the second day, YERUN Rectors held a workshop on Talent Development, and exchanged views on the role of universities in the development of the future FP10 with DG RTD Deputy Director, Ms Signe Ratso.



Hosting the YERUN General Assembly at NOVA during our 50th-anniversary celebration provided a unique opportunity to strengthen our position as a European young university with a strong emphasis on research. As we continue to expand our international presence beyond Europe, this positioning becomes increasingly significant, highlighted by initiatives such as the recent development of our campus in Cairo and the establishment of strategic partnerships in Latin America and Sub-Saharan Africa.

Bringing like-minded European partners to Lisbon for the YERUN General Assembly also served as an opportunity to reinforce this identity principle within various units of our university.

The choice of different meeting locations, including the schools of medicine, social sciences, the Rectorate, and the school of business and economics, allowed us to showcase the diversity of our university and demonstrate our active participation in YERUN across various departments.

Moreover, this event addressed a crucial aspect that will shape the future of higher education – defining a comprehensive talent policy within European terms for a young university focused on research and education. It provided a platform to share our Teaching and Learning Innovation Policies, engaging in discussions regarding the talent implications embedded therein.

In summary, hosting our YERUN partners was an extraordinary opportunity for NOVA to showcase our university and its ambitions while aligning with shared values.

Research Assessment

YERUN has continued contributing to the advancement of the reform of research assessment during 2023 by means of incorporating our member's vision into <u>Coara</u> (Coalition for Advancing Research Assessment) through the various meetings and exchanges held in the context of the YERUN ad hoc Group on Coara. So far, 13 out of 23 YERUN members have signed the Coara agreement and are contributing to implement reforms within their institutions.

2023 has not only seen the consolidation of the Coalition's Steering Board and Secretariat (who held two General Assemblies, two CoARA Working Group (WG) calls and brokerage events), but also the preparations for the creation of an extended CoARA Secretariat. YERUN is an active part of the extended Secretariat, coleading Work Package 4 of the CoARA Boost Project, which started officially in October, and is key, since it provides operational support to the WGs. In 2023, the CoARA Steering Board selected 13 WGs, and 5 YERUN members are active members of several of them.

CoARA is aimed at catalysing a systemic change in the assessment of research institutions, research projects and processes and researchers themselves. As such, it can succeed only if an international coordinated effort, such as that fostered via the YERUN Ad Hoc Group on CoARA, helps in exchanging views and practices among settings and universities that have come a long way in this process (e.g., those in the Netherlands and Norway) and those in more inert systems that are highly prescribed via national legislation, as is the case in Croatia, where the process is at its beginning. All this helps our efforts in CoARA itself, as well as in the CoARA Working Groups that we have joined. We, at the University of Rijeka are thus really thankful to our colleagues from the YERUN partners for providing us the opportunity to learn from them and to the YERUN Brussels Office for coordinating this process.

Research Careers

2023 was a big year for research careers. On 8 December the Competitiveness Council reached a political agreement on a Council Recommendation for a European framework to attract and retain research, innovation, and entrepreneurial talent in Europe, officially adopted on 18 December.

With the invaluable input from the highly dedicated members of its ad hoc group Development of Academic Careers (and continued support from the YERUN Policy Platform), YERUN played a key consultative role in developing the proposal presented by the Commission and the final text of the recommendation. Besides our continual engagement and advocacy directed towards the Council Presidency Working Party on Research, on 2 November YERUN teamed up with leading European university associations in issuing a collective statement calling for greater ambition for the Council Recommendation and for further steps and proactive commitments that individual Member States must in turn undertake.

In the past year, a lot has been happening in Europe in terms of Academic Careers. The YERUN Brussels Office has been instrumental in sharing new policy developments to the universities at an early stage of development, and simultaneously gathering input to further shape these policies. In addition, being able to connect with colleagues at other YERUN universities who are concerned with similar topics, has been particularly inspiring. The Research Careers lunchtime series at the start of the summer were also an excellent opportunity to showcase good practices and challenging thoughts in the wider policy arena around YERUN.

This strong advocacy was building on the important work earlier in the year where the YERUN organised a series of online events on early career researchers (Lunchtime series on Early Career Researchers) and with the publication of the YERUN Position Paper Towards a European Framework for Sustainable and Attractive Careers in Higher Education as a response to the European Commission consultation, calling for policy coherence as well as pointing to the need for specific enabling framework conditions and provisions targeting early career researchers. In alignment with these initiatives, the February newsletter focused on promoting intersectoral mobility of researchers, adding another dimension that will contribute to fostering vibrant research careers.

Furthermore, during 2023 the EU-funded project Sustainable Careers for Researcher Empowerment (SECURE) has catalysed close collaboration of European stakeholders, including the YERUN Brussels Office and three YERUN member universities (Cyprus, NOVA and Rijeka), on enhancing the attractiveness of research careers by analysing the state of the art of research career frameworks and tenure track-like models, and consequently providing evidence-based recommendations and feedback to the European Commission. Looking ahead to 2024, enabled by the SECURE project, YERUN will continue to advance on research careers, especially within the academic sector, via a selected on-the-ground pilot implementation of some key features of the adopted research careers framework, contributing to better understand provide challenges at stake and further recommendations for improved career prospects of researchers.

All the research and teaching activities, all the strategies, all the policies of the universities will fail if we don't have highly motivated and skilled staff that will work on their implementation. The development of academic careers is, therefore, of outmost importance not because it is high on the European policy agenda, but because it is imperative for the further development and growth of our institutions. The exchange of information, views and best practices on these topics that is taking place in the YERUN Ad Hoc Group on the Development of Academic Careers is highly beneficial to the University of Rijeka in tuning its internal discussions and policies and aligning them with those of our YERUN partners, to the benefit of our researchers and teachers as well as that of our institution as a whole.

Open Science

Our work on Open Science has continued with the same passion that has accompanied us on this topic since YERUN's foundation. The YERUN ad hoc group on Open Science has worked regularly on a series of peer learning exchanges on topics such as Open Science Policies, Open Science and Intellectual Property Rights, Citizen Science and Open Educational Resources. Furthermore, on 14 February (as per tradition!) the award ceremony of the YERUN Open Science Awards took place, with five inspiring projects being awarded in 2023, which you can access here. It was also great to see so many inspiring initiatives organised by the members on the occasion of the Open Access International Week, and that we have collected in the October newsletter. In November, we launched the third call of the YERUN Open Science Awards and we

finalised the year with our traditional Open Science Advent Calendar.

Active engagement in YERUN's Open Science Working Group sparked enriching discussions on various topics including Open Science Policies, intellectual property rights, Open Educational Resources, and Citizen Science, enhancing our collective knowledge and academic advancement. The knowledge exchange with the YERUN members proves that Open Science is not merely a buzzword but a tangible commitment to drive innovation, establish collaborations and increase the societal impact of our science through openness and transparency. And most importantly, it's not a race, but an endeavour we are all equally invested in. In the end, we all cross the finish line together.

Beyond merely acknowledging our commitment to open science, the award served as a source of motivation to elevate our practices and foster a thriving OS culture.

In line with this commitment, we have recently established an annual Open Science Award at KIOS CoE. This initiative aims to recognise individuals who embrace OS practices, encouraging others to adopt their exemplary approach.

YERUN has also advanced in its commitment towards Open Science through the OPUS (Open Universal Science) project. OPUS helps reforming research assessment through a system that incentivises researchers to practice open science practices. During 2023, the project has taken big steps towards its goals! Having the Universities of Cyprus, Nova University Lisbon and the university of Rijeka as partners, YERUN has contributed to the creation of a Researcher Assessment Framework and has led the work on the action plans governing future pilots, which will start in January 2024.

University of Potsdam has pursued a long-term digital strategy for open access to cultural data and cultural heritage. Our goal is to make literary archives as institutions more open, their collections and data more accessible and thus research in the archive more transparent. The YERUN Open Science Award greatly recognises, underlines and supports our efforts in this area. Being part of the Young European Research Universities Network YERUN also anchors us in a vibrant European research landscape.

The Open Science Group has developed an intense activity this year. A variety of topics have been discussed, among which there are two that help YERUN reflect on new upcoming challenges: Open Educational Resources (OER), where some institutions are starting to design policies, and Citizen Science, increasingly important in strengthening the relationships between research and society. From a practical point of view, the engagements with Open Research Europe (ORE) were very useful to know this alternative approach to publishing in EU-funded projects, which may lead to a change of paradigm in publishing sooner than expected

The YERUN Open Science Award contributed greatly to our ability to develop a graphical user interface for our open-source R package called {rock}, which offers qualitative researchers worldwide a non-proprietary option for Computer-Assisted Qualitative Data Analysis Software. Using the Reproducible Open Coding Kit (ROCK) standard and software allows researchers to be more transparent about their process, which increases confirmability and reproducibility in research.

Empowering higher education institutions in Europe

Following our commitment to ERA Action 13, dedicated to empowering Higher Education Institutions, YERUN has been participating in four meetings of a European Commission subgroup on ERA for Universities. In 2023, the work of the group has led to the development of a toolbox of measures that will help universities increase their global competitiveness, among which a potential European Excellence Initiative has been discussed. More ambition is needed though if it would aim to see the light in the future. Check our YERUN's position on the topic!

European Universities alliances

With 16 members involved in 8 European Universities Alliances (CIVIS, EDUC, EPICUR, EUGLOH, EUNIWELL, EUTOPIA, UNIVERSEH, YUFE), YERUN has a critical mass to take the pulse of ongoing and future developments relating to the initiative. 2023 was dedicated to the two topics that are discussions on the alliances: the Investment Pathway, to secure the future financial sustainability of the initiative, and the Monitoring Framework, to measure the transformative potential of the initiative as a whole. In this context, YERUN has also participated in the II Forum on the European Universities Initiative organised in Barcelona by the Spanish Presidency of the Council of the EU, as well as in two workshops organised by DG EAC in June and November. Strong of the common understanding reached so far within its ad hoc group on Alliances as well as at the leadership level, YERUN will continue working on this topic throughout 2024.

Being part of the Ad hoc group on European Universities Initiative has been an enriching experience. The YERUN team has provided us with valuable updates on the agenda and have managed to create a safe environment for sharing knowledge.

ERA Forum

2023 has marked a very intense year for the ERA Forum and for stakeholders' involvement into its implementation. With many Actions up and running already, in May the ERA Forum made a gap analysis to assess the drawbacks of the current ERA Policy Agenda (see <u>YERUN position</u> on the topic). That exercise has led the basis for subsequent discussions within the ERA Forum on the structure and the objectives of the ERA Policy Agenda – discussions that are still ongoing. YERUN has been very vocal in stressing the need for a thorough reflection on the structure, for a supporting policy narrative, and for an agreement on what Actions should be about (see October reflection).



Overall, this process has been instrumental in making the participants to the ERA Forum more aware of their role in driving the Policy Agenda and take more ownership of the process from beginning to end. We are therefore looking forward to reaching this common understanding and to simplify the construction of the future policy agenda.

It is always gratifying to be able to meet colleagues from other partner universities, share opinions and experiences, and learn about our good practices so that we can implement them at our university. Horizon Europe and Erasmus+

On this note, we are of course thrilled about the positive news on the UK's association to Horizon Europe. We are extremely grateful to the YERUN Policy Platform, the YERUN group of Research Support Offices and the YERUN group on Erasmus+ for their great insights that paved the basis for the YERUN positions on these topics.

YERUN's Erasmus+ group allows us as Higher Education Institutions in Europe to come together and not only exchange experiences and gain insights into the diverse approaches to tackling common goals and challenges, but also to form a joint, and thereby stronger voice to make an impact in the future development of the Erasmus+ programme.

YERUN ad hoc group on Innovative Teaching and Learning

After a series of peer learning meetings held on topics relating to the governance of Lifelong Learning at universities, their relating strategies and financing mechanisms, the connections to the labour market and the attractiveness of their offer, group's members delved into the topic of Micro-credentials as a tool to foster Lifelong Learning. The YERUN ad hoc group on Lifelong Learning partnered-up with YERUN members involved in the **ProcToGo project**, and a **great event dedicated to Micro-credentials** was organised in Brussels on 23 November. The event brought together around 60 on-site participants and a fantastic line-up of speakers, from the European Commission, the OECD, the European Confederation of Search and Selection Associations (ECSSA), the European Consortium of Innovative Universities (ECIU) and YERUN members involved in the project. As an outcome, the group is now co-drafting guidelines for universities on how to plan and implement Micro-credentials. Lifelong Learning has been a focal point also in the YERUN newsletter this year, with coverage on two significant themes. In July, we delved into **Skills and Lifelong Learning**, aligning with the Commission's priorities for the year. Our November newsletter spotlighted Microcredentials and Lifelong Learning, providing valuable insights into emerging trends in education at YERUN member institutions.



We started 2023 joined by Nicolas Copernicus University and closed the year with the incorporation of Tallinn University. Two new universities joining our network and counting up to a total growth of 10 new members since 2021.
